Project Brief

Promoting biodiversity-based products for the improvement of livelihoods and biodiversity protection

ASEAN's rich natural resources and biodiversity offer significant potential for the region's socio-economic development. Now more than ever, it is vital to understand and acknowledge the value of biodiversity.

Context

The ASEAN Member States accommodate about 18% of the species of the Earth; 3 of the 18 mega biodiversity countries; about 35% of the global mangrove forests; and 30% of the coral reefs. This wealth in biodiversity poses opportunities for the economic development of the region.

The AMS want to use this economic potential by further developing trade relations for bio-products (organic trade) nationally, regionally and possibly globally. However, the potential of Biodiversity-based Products (BBP), especially for the local indigenous population in buffer zones of protected areas in the region, is not yet sufficiently analyzed, and their market potential often unknown.

To promote ASEAN national policies on conservation, particularly in the framework of the United Nations Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD), ASEAN has established the ASEAN Centre for Biodiversity (ACB), an intergovernmental institution, to address the protection of biodiversity on a regional level, to develop and disseminate joint strategies as well as to explore win-win

opportunities, merging biodiversity protection with livelihood improvement for the mostly poor population.
