Implementing Timber Legality Assurance Systems

A guide to comply with timber legality requirements in Equatorial Guinea and to support due diligence



Timber Legality Assurance Systems are being developed in a number of countries. They ensure that wood products conform to national laws and help to prevent the illegal importation of timber. The systems are dependent on governments developing effective control and verification systemsandoperatorscomplyingwithlegalrequirementsandconducting due diligence - in this context identifying and minimizing the risks associated with imported timber. By being aware of legal requirements in Equatorial Guinea and the risks of legal non-compliance, highlighted below, law enforcement agencies and importers can implement control and mitigation measures to prevent timber being illegally harvested, transported and traded.



HARVESTING TIMBER



Assure that land ownership is clear and companies have proper legal authorization to harvest.

Assure that companies are following management plans and respecting requirements such as minimum diameters, protected areas and species, and recovery periods.

Assure that the customary land rights of local communities have been respected and adequate compensation provided.

Assure that companies have made true declarations of timber volumes and harvested tree species, and that no transport documents have been transferred illegally between companies.

Assure that processing companies are operating with authorization and have met environmental and labor requirements.

ACTIONS FOR IMPORTERS



Harvest permits and management plans should be assessed to ensure they have been issued legally and fulfil legal requirements. Contact competent local authorities to confirm the legality of the documents.

Assess documents providing evidence that companies have paid fees and taxes

and ensure correct prices are being applied to the material harvested. Contact



competent authorities to confirm the validity of payments. Conduct on-site evaluations of forest operations, including the extent of the harvesting area, the species and volumes harvested, and health and safety



Conduct on-site evaluations to assess whether local communities maintain their rights over and access to land. Assess legal documentation, including permits and management plans, and interview relevant stakeholders. Evaluate supply chain documents to confirm that information is correct and



Conduct on-site evaluations of processing facilities to confirm whether they operate legally with the required permits and registrations and are fulfilling legal requirements covering environmental protections and working conditions.

Check that each document is up to date, has been signed/stamped by the authorized agencies, and is consistent with other documents and with actual products and volumes being sold/exported.
